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IN THE FOOTSTEPS OF THE SON OF MAN by Joseph Nioroge, nSJ



As we celebrate the Silver Jubilee of the Novitiate, our brothers and the Solemnity of our founding

father, the words of Jesus in Mt 8:20 captured my attention: "Foxes have dens and birds of the sky have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to rest his head." These words apply to our jubilarians and to us all. As a first year novice, I am beginning to have this experience in the novitiate: in effect I am saying that I don't have, or aspire to have a place that I can call my very own. Granted that I have a self-contained 'villa' (my room, which contains a sink, a wardrobe, etc.), still, it isn't really mine, because after a few months I will vacate it and move to another, which I will also vacate after a few months. Ultimately, I will leave this novitiate, and 'my room' at the time of my leaving will be given to another novice, or remain empty, waiting to accom-

modate a visitor, if need be.

We live in a world where having more is considered the best or only option. In practicing detachment, we contradict the world, or the world contradicts us, just as Simeon predicted with regards to Christ (Lk 2:34) where he refers to Jesus as a 'sign,' meaning that with our Lord there is always a greater reality than what we perceive. Christ's way of life is a call to everybody to imitate him. He should be the yardstick by which we gauge ourselves.

There is more to poverty and detachment, as St Ignatius said: "I must consider only the end for which I am created, that is, for the praise of God and for the salvation of my soul". I believe that material goods in themselves are not bad; God placed us in the Garden of Eden after creating all things. He wanted us to enjoy his gifts. But since 'the fall,' we have developed disordered attachments, and therefore material goods place us in an awkward situation; we risk loving them more than God, the custodian of all goods, hence not attaining the end for which we were created. There is nobody who would be pleased, at the end of his life, to realize that his life was a waste. Embracing the poverty of our Lord is meant to augment our efforts to make the most out of this short life. When viewed in this light, poverty becomes less of a burden and more of a gift.

In the poverty of our Lord we can see His love. He was at liberty to just give instructions on poverty to a prophet, but He knew that detachment is a struggle, and He wanted to personally show us that it is both possible and fulfilling. His love is also seen in the fact that He identifies with us to the extreme: in addition to taking the form of man, he took the form of those who are at the 'bottom of the food chain', the poor, the weak, outcasts. In becoming like us, his desire is for us to be like him, to follow his example here on earth, and then to share in the benefits of his divine kingship in the afterlife.

Indeed, it is quite a privilege to follow in the footsteps of the Son of Man who, unlike foxes which have dens and birds which have nests, has nowhere to rest his head. I am in awe of my dear brothers who have done the same for twenty five years.

My heart is overwhelmed; my life testifies to your love and Grace



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JESUIT: A FORMED HEART AND MIND. By Michael Kyalo Kinaka. nSJ





Brief history of the AOR Province and its Novitiate.

St. Ignatius missioned fifteen Jesuits to Ethiopia in 1553 creating the first Jesuit missions to Africa. There were subsequent missions to Ethiopia led by notable persons such as Pedro Paez.


The roots of the present AOR Province began in Ethiopia when Canadian Jesuits arrived in the country in 1945. The 1960s and '70s saw many more Jesuits from other provinces, such as Malta, Karnataka, Ranch, Bombay and Goa-Puna (India) establish missions in Eastern Africa. Jesuits from the British, Chicago, Detroit and New York provinces also laboured in Eastern Africa in the 70s.

The predecessor of the Eastern Africa Province, the Eastern Africa Region was created by the then superior General, Fr. Arupe on 31st of July in 1976 on the Feast day of St. Ignatius. An Indian Jesuit, Fr. Polycarp Toppo was the regional superior. After ten years of progress, the region was elevated to full fledged Province of Eastern Africa on the 31st of July 1986.

The Novitiate was established in Morogoro, Tanzania in July 1991 and moved to Arusha in 1992 under the then Provincial, Fr. Paul Besanceney SJ. The Novitiate continues to mold young Jesuits .
